Dear Colleagues,

I hope by now you have received a copy of the new Partnering Agreement. Thank you for the many positive comments that have already been made and apologies that we are unable to offer anymore SIPs due to the demand we have already had. We will, as a team, consider for the future how we can service the demand.

The dates for the Understanding Christianity Scheme of Work will shortly be shared with your RE Coordinators. I have been asked if this will replace the Diocesan Syllabus and the short answer is no. The scheme is there to complement what we have and to help bridge some of the challenges we have had with some of the units of work from the current resource. Margaret and Caroline will continue to support all of our schools with RE and will be running the training for the new resource.

Gill Hedworth is now part of the team and working out of Church House in North Shields. Gill has joined the team with a wealth of experience in PSHCE. She is in particular a specialist for behaviour, welfare and personal development. Sadly I cannot include Gill's time as part of the SLA, however, she is available to schools for a cost of £400 per day or £250 per half day. I highly recommend her work and Gill will be running some training for all Heads on Child Mental Health issues in the Summer term (dates to follow)

The Education Character Conference has attracted a large amount of interest. We look forward to having Nigel Genders, Chief Education Officer, in the region not only to talk to us about the National perspective of Character Education, but also to listen to your views about Church Schools in the North East of England. Surrounding Dioceses are asking to attend the Conference - if you have not signed up yet, please do so as soon as possible as I need to release availability to other colleagues.

A number of our schools have undergone Section 8 Inspections. A recurring theme is non-compliance of websites. If you are in any doubt please ensure your site has been checked and checked again - one document missing is enough to fail the check.

SIAMS training is available on the following dates:

- Cuthbert House, Durham on Monday 24th April 2017
- Church House, North Shields on Wednesday 3rd May 2017

If the new framework is not delivered by Summer 2018 I will offer further training to colleagues to ensure coverage across both Dioceses.

The team remain in regular contact with the RSC and local authorities. We are currently working on how we can access the £130million Fund for School Improvement. When we have news we will share this with colleagues.

Again - thank you for your ongoing support as DDE - the team and I appreciate the positive feedback and we continue to work to serve you in any way that we can.

Christingle at Newcastle Cathedral



The Children's Society held its brand new Christingle event in partnership with Newcastle Cathedral on Thursday 2 February, The Feast of Candlemas and the last day of the Christmas season. The highlight of the day being a cathedral full of almost 400 children from regional schools and a giant inflatable orange!

Reverend Kate Bottley, a wellknown broadcaster from Channel 4's Gogglebox programme and a regular guest on Radio 2 Chris

Evans show and Songs of Praise, was the special guest speaker at the event hosted by the cathedral's Canon Clare McLaren. The day started with eleven schools arriving from across the region and after a welcome from the cathedral and The Children's Society, schools took part in activities like Christingle making, exploring the cathedral



through treasure hunts, learning about the work of The Children's Society, and craft workshops.



The event culminated after lunch with the Christingle service and Reverend Kate Bottley making herself into a human Christingle to illustrate how we can all be the light of Christingle in our own communities. Surrounded by children representing the sweets, the candle and the red ribbon, she inflated a giant orange suit that was hidden under her robes!

Helen Whiteley of The Children's Society said, 'We were delighted with the response from schools

across the region to our first big event at the Cathedral and thrilled to see the building filled with children and the lights of Christingle. We hope everyone had a fun and interesting day and that schools will join us again hopefully next year'.



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The Children's Society has two large projects based in Newcastle with a wide reach across the north east. The SCARPA project works with young people who go missing from home and those that may be at risk of sexual exploitation. And the SMART project supports refugee and migrant families through weekly advice drop in sessions and longer term individual targeted family support. They also offer a programme of social activities for families and run training for partner agencies.

The Church has always played an integral part in being at the forefront of social action. It has, for many years, championed young people and fought to ensure that every child flourishes. Whilst The Children's Society's work has changed over the last 135 years, the vision remains the same: a country where children are free from disadvantage. Together, united by a common vision, we can make a difference.

Evenwood CofE Primary School win School of the Year Award



Evenwood C of E Primary is a school of 98 pupils in the heart of County Durham where, as the nomination points out, social deprivation is a major issue.

Therefore, much of the nomination was about how all the staff, starting with the Headteacher Helen Sutherland, the deputy head, teachers, TAs, cleaner, caretaker, all set high standards which permeate throughout the school, and all go above and beyond the call of duty, and all welcome children and families no matter their needs and requirements.

It is a true community school, with a highly inclusive and nurturing approach, taking in children who have had difficulties elsewhere and turning them around so from outsiders and non-attenders they become fully integrated into school life and, above all, happy.

The nomination says: "The school environment places value upon the balance between discipline and a fun learning environment, where each pupil is important and where they are encouraged to develop personally and academically. It is an extremely caring school."

The judges were impressed by all of this, but they were also impressed by how it was translating into results. Key Stage 2 attainment for example showed the school performing well above the national average in all subjects, and the children's progress showed the school was in the top 5% of all schools nationally for reading, top 10% for writing and top 20% for maths.

Any village would be proud of such a school, but for such a school to be found in Evenwood is indeed outstanding, and for that reason Evenwood is our school of the year.

Commemorating Holocaust Memorial Day with St Andrew's CofE First School

Andrew Wheatley, Headteacher at St Andrew's Heddon-on-the-Wall CofE First School, gives an account of what the children in Key Stage 2 have done for Holocaust Memorial Day:

In Key Stage 2 we have been learning about the Holocaust. We used the materials provided by the Holocaust Memorial Trust and watched a video from BBC Newsround. The children listened to stories from Holocaust survivors from both World War 2 and from the conflict in Rwanda.



The children then wrote poems / prayers and selected the most powerful line which spoke specifically to them. They then wrote this line onto a special flat stone using permanent markers.

We are going to varnish the stones to seal in the words and place them in our Holocaust Memorial Garden.





We were also inspired by a display that we saw on Newsround which is at the Imperial War Museum North and is based around the Star of David.



Each child coloured two stars and we mounted them on a display board with the words of Zigi Shipper in the centre about how we cannot change the past but can make a big difference to the present and the future.

Churches all over the Diocese are holding events during the weekend which are being supported and attended by Bishops from across the North of England. The events are taking place in a variety of locations with the central theme of talking about Jesus and engaging with the wider community.

Whitley Memorial CofE First School: Awe and Wonder at Newcastle Cathedral

Claire Bruce, Year 4 Teacher at Whitley Memorial C of E First School in Bedlington, writes:

On Wednesday 25th January 2017, the Year 4 children from The Whitley visited Newcastle Cathedral. The main aim of the visit was to enrich the RE curriculum, especially the topics of Prayer and Places of Worship.

On arrival, the children and staff were warmly welcomed by Canon Steven who talked about the structure of the day and gave background information about the cathedral. The children sat calmly, silenced by the awe and wonder of their new environment.





Following the introductory session, the children were split into groups to partake in a carousel of three different workshops/experiences. Canon Steven led one of the workshops, which was about prayer and key pieces of cathedral furniture. The children listened very carefully and successfully answered the questions. They really enjoyed the practical demonstration of baptism, performed by the Canon. Everyone was fascinated by the explanation of why the tower has moved over the years; it was caused by digging work to lay pipes for the first gas lights in the world on Mosley Street.

Another experience was led by Mrs Gibb. The focus of this activity was to learn about icons through the medium of craft work. The children created their own icons by choosing and drawing a Biblical figure. They successfully used their imagination to decorate and embellish their designs. The icons will be displayed in the school and on their website.





The third session was Godly Play and was led by Mrs Robertson and Mrs Scarlett. This was the first

experience of Godly Play for both the children and staff and everyone was extremely impressed. It was a very spiritual experience for all and gave everyone a time to question, wonder and reflect in a calm and peaceful environment. After the story, the 'feast' was a great success and a lovely sharing time for both the children and adults.

Overall, everyone had a fantastic religious experience which not only fulfilled both AT1 and AT2 of the curriculum but also delivered so much more. It was an outstanding visit which the school would highly recommend to others.

The Whitley would like to express praise and thanks to the welcoming and professional staff who led the visit and also to the children whose behaviour and positive attitude to the experiences made the school very proud. A conversation overhead from one of the children on the way home summed up the whole day: "I don't want this visit to end as I have had such an awesome day."



It's back to school for lan Ramsey CofE Academy parents

More than 40 parents of students in years 10 and 11 at Ian Ramsey Church of England Academy in Stockton, have been amongst the first learning how to support their children's exam preparation and revision by going back to school to learn the latest techniques themselves.

Ian Ramsey, a Church of England Secondary Academy School in the Diocese of Durham and part of the Dayspring Trust, has set out to find new ways to support their students achieve the very best results in their year 11 GCSE's by briefing parents on exam revision techniques and understanding how people learn.

The initiative is probably a first in the area and maybe the region. James Walters, Assistant Head Teacher for Assessment and Curriculum at Ian Ramsey, said: "Through this academic year, we have been organising curriculum evenings for parents and carers to come in and learn more about the curriculum in the school. This is so they can help to support their children and also so they can gain a better understanding of what we do in school.

"As part of that, we are responding to a parental demand to find out more about revision techniques and how to support students in Key Stage 4 who are needing to remember more than they have ever had to before. This, with the changes in curriculum, have become evermore difficult."

One set of parents, Mr & Mrs Alwis who have a child in year 10 and another in year 8, said: "The GCSEs are all changing and getting tougher, so we think that this kind of session can really help us support our children. As parents, we don't know what is going on with the education system and how we can best support learning - so this is a great help for us. We are greatly appreciative of the school for organising this session."

The session undertaken by parents included two workshops on revision techniques and revision timetables, one on general learning techniques and another on memory techniques - getting the best out of our brains. Finally, one workshop also focussed on stress and anxiety management.

Talking about the sessions, Michelle McCarthy, Assistant Head Teacher for Teaching and Learning, said: "Parents and Carers have been able to take part in sessions looking at different aspects of teaching and learning around the following topics: how to revise; what it's like to be a student in a GCSE classroom; what topics they might be learning about, and the sheer volume of information students are required to reduce down, remember, recall and then use in an exam situation. As well as showing parents the techniques for learning and revising, one of the most important sessions is on stress and anxiety management which is about supporting young people throughout Key Stage 4 which can be a very difficult time for them."

She added: "All of the staff involved in the sessions are delighted to be able to show parents some of the techniques as they will directly support the students and that is what we are here for."

The sessions are focused mainly on parents of students in Year 11, but they are also open to parents with children in year 10 who have expressly asked to be involved at an early stage. This may have been the first set of sessions, but it is unlikely to be the last. The enthusiastic response of parents learning how best to support their children was very positive.

Prayer Spaces in Schools

Gill Booth, Executive Head at Venerable Bede CofE Academy in Sunderland, writes:

"How can we alleviate stress and improve the well-being of our young people in an age where evidence proves that young people are far more stressed than they were even 10 years ago? This was the key question discussed by the headteachers of the 5 CE secondary schools in the Durham Diocese. The result was a joint project, funded by the Hild and Bede Trust, which focused on how prayer spaces can support mental health and develop resilience.



"We chose Year 7 initially as they also have to contend with the transition from primary to secondary school. However, many other pupils were involved as the spaces were left open during break and lunch. The feedback was extraordinary with pupils reporting that they felt peaceful and enjoyed exploring their feelings in a place where no-one would judge them: "It's a place where I can be truthful" said one pupil. Another commented, "I was able to get rid of my feelings of anger and I now feel much calmer."

"The project was very much pupil-led. Older pupils volunteered to lead the activities with the project culminating in an exhibition: presentations and videos showed how each school's prayer space had improved well-being, whether pupils believed in God or not. Activities varied from school to school and all pupils were



able to visit each other's stands at the exhibition and try out new things.

"No project that we have used in school has had a bigger impact on pupil wellbeing than this one and it is something that many of our pupils would like to see as an annual event."

Do you want to know how to get started with a Prayer Space in your school?

This Training Workshop is for anyone interested in prayer spaces, including children's and youth workers, clergy, parents, school staff and volunteers.

More than 2000 temporary prayer spaces have been hosted in primary and secondary schools around the UK so far. These prayer spaces usually take place in classroom-sized areas that have been transformed for a few days or for a week, and are hosted by a small team of suitably trained, local Christians.

Prayer spaces provide a safe, creative, engaging environment for students, of faith and of no faith, to explore their sense of identity, to reflect on their relationships and on ways to resolve difficulties and conflict, to consider how they engage with the wider world, and to experience prayer.

All over the UK, prayer spaces have been welcomed and praised by Head teachers, teachers and parents as a valuable contribution to the RE and PSHE syllabus, in line with government requirements, as well as assisting in the statutory responsibility to support the spiritual and moral development of the students.
