LO: passive and active voice Friday 27th November 2020

The active voice of a verb tells us that someone (or something) does the action in a sentence.

> James watered the flowers.

The **passive voice** of a verb tells us that someone (or something) has an action done to them.

The flowers were watered by James.

Sarah finished the homework.



The homework was finished by Sarah.

The puppy chewed the shoe.

Can you change this sentence so the verb is in the <u>passive voice</u>? The horse ate the carrot. The shoe was chewed by the puppy.

Can you change this sentence so the verb is in the <u>active voice</u>? The book was written by Sam.

Active

When the subject of the sentence is doing something the verb is active.
E.g. The man wore a grey hat.
Subject – man verb – wore object – hat



Passive

When the object of the sentence is having something done to it, the verb is passive.
The grey hat was worn by the man.
Object – hat verb – worn subject – man
