




During the Victorian period, and especially after around 1850, people had more leisure time than ever before. Britain was prosperous so more people had well paid jobs that allowed them to take time off work. Laws were introduced to limit the number of hours people were able to work to protect employers from taking advantage of their employees. Public holidays were also introduced. This meant that instead of leisure time being only for the rich, more and more people were able to enjoy time off.





## Seaside trips



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The invention of the steam train meant that people could quickly and cheaply travel to the seaside for the day and seaside holidays became very popular. Seaside resorts, such as Blackpool and Brighton, expanded rapidly and not only offered holidaymakers fun with buckets, spades and paddling but also provided Punch and Judy shows, fish and chips wrapped in newspaper, shopping arcades, brass bands and concert halls.






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# Watching a Punch and Judy Show










# The Circus

Circuses became extremely popular during the 19th century. Touring circuses travelled all over the country with wagons of performers and equipment in tow. They were able to travel more easily as the railways developed. The Victorians loved seeing jugglers, clowns, trapeze artists, horse riding stunts and wild animals.

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














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Circuses often had freak shows too. These were acts of curiosity such as very small people, bearded ladies, giants, siamese twins or people with deformities. People flocked to see these examples of humanity they had never witnessed before.





# The Theatre





The theatre was always a fun trip out for a Victorian family. Some theatres became known as music halls. Music halls held a wide variety of acts, such as singing, dancing, comedian shows and other acts. Music hall songs became very popular and people enjoyed singing along to the wellknown tunes. Richer people also went to the theatre to watch ballet, opera or classical concerts. These theatres were much grander than those used for music hall.





Sometimes, shows would last as long as 5 hours. People loved the trickery that was used to create effects, like trap doors and smoke screens.




Families also enjoyed going to pantomimes. Writers started to rewrite old stories such as Jack and the Beanstalk and Cinderella into pantomime stories and the scenery and costumes became much more elaborate.








People have always loved sports but until the Victorian era, teams couldn't travel far to play different teams and they didn't have the time to play hours of sport. Different areas had different rules for the same game but this slowly changed as sport became more organised and organisations were formed to set up rules and tournaments. For example: in 1863 the Football Association was formed; in 1871 Rugby Football Union was set up; in 1877 the first international cricket test match was held and the first Wimbledon tennis championship was held. Sport became just as much fun to watch as to play.

## Wimbledon 1877








## Parks and zoos



VICTORIA PARK: THE SAND-PIT.




Public parks became very popular during the Victorian period. They were often planted with exotic flowers and had lakes and trees. In busy cities, they were a welcome slice of the countryside. They often had bandstands for entertainment too and vendors selling kites, balloons and other treats.




Some parks also had zoos where children could see animals from other countries, such as bears, lions, tigers, hippos, leopards, elephants, camels and exotic birds.












# Leisure at home

Of course, there were plenty of ways to enjoy yourself at home too. With more children going to school because of the change in child protection laws, reading became more and more of a popular pastime. There were more public libraries too which let people take books out for free. Lots of children's books were published during this time, including classics such as Alice in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll. Comics for children were also introduced.
