Who built the Titanic? What caused the collision?

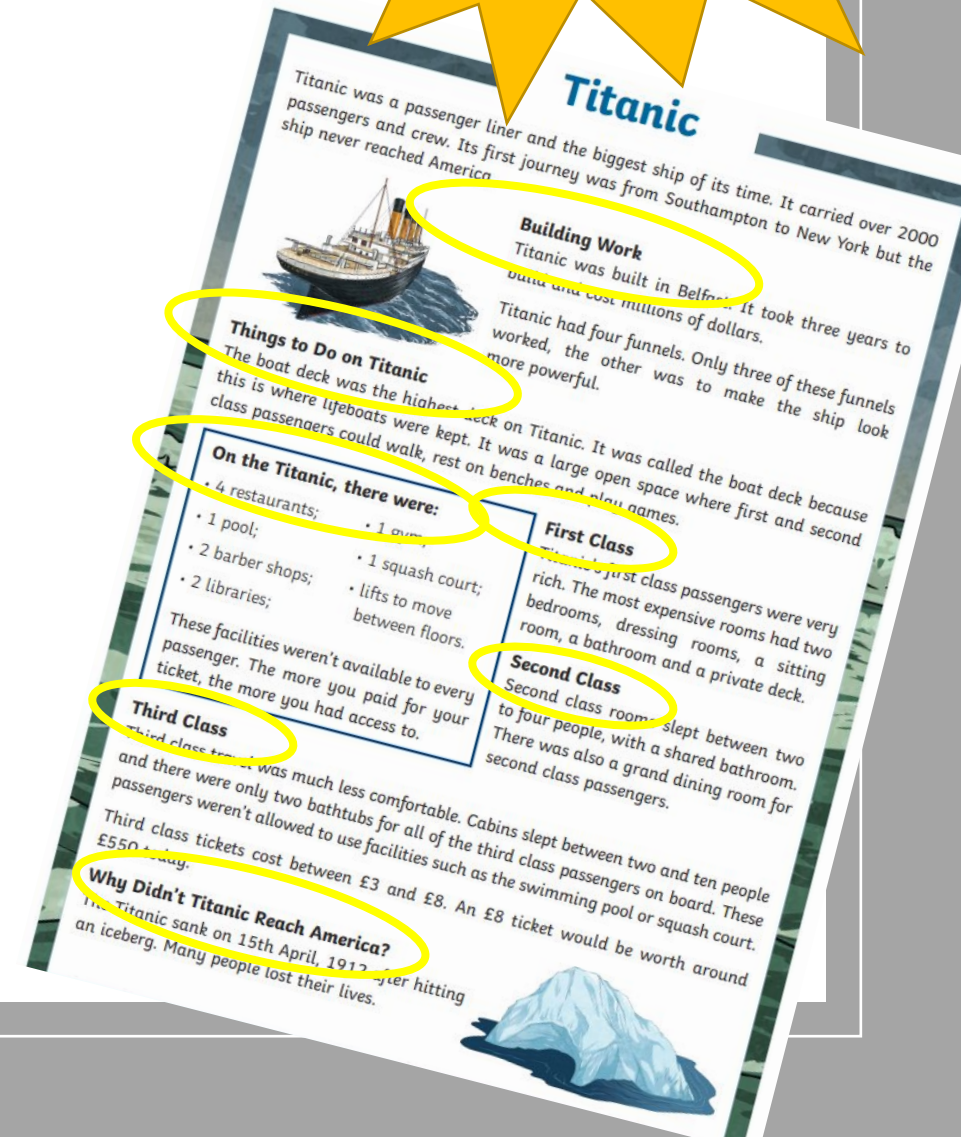
Or perhaps you could 'jazz up' your subheadings with some alliteration:

You could even include a pun:

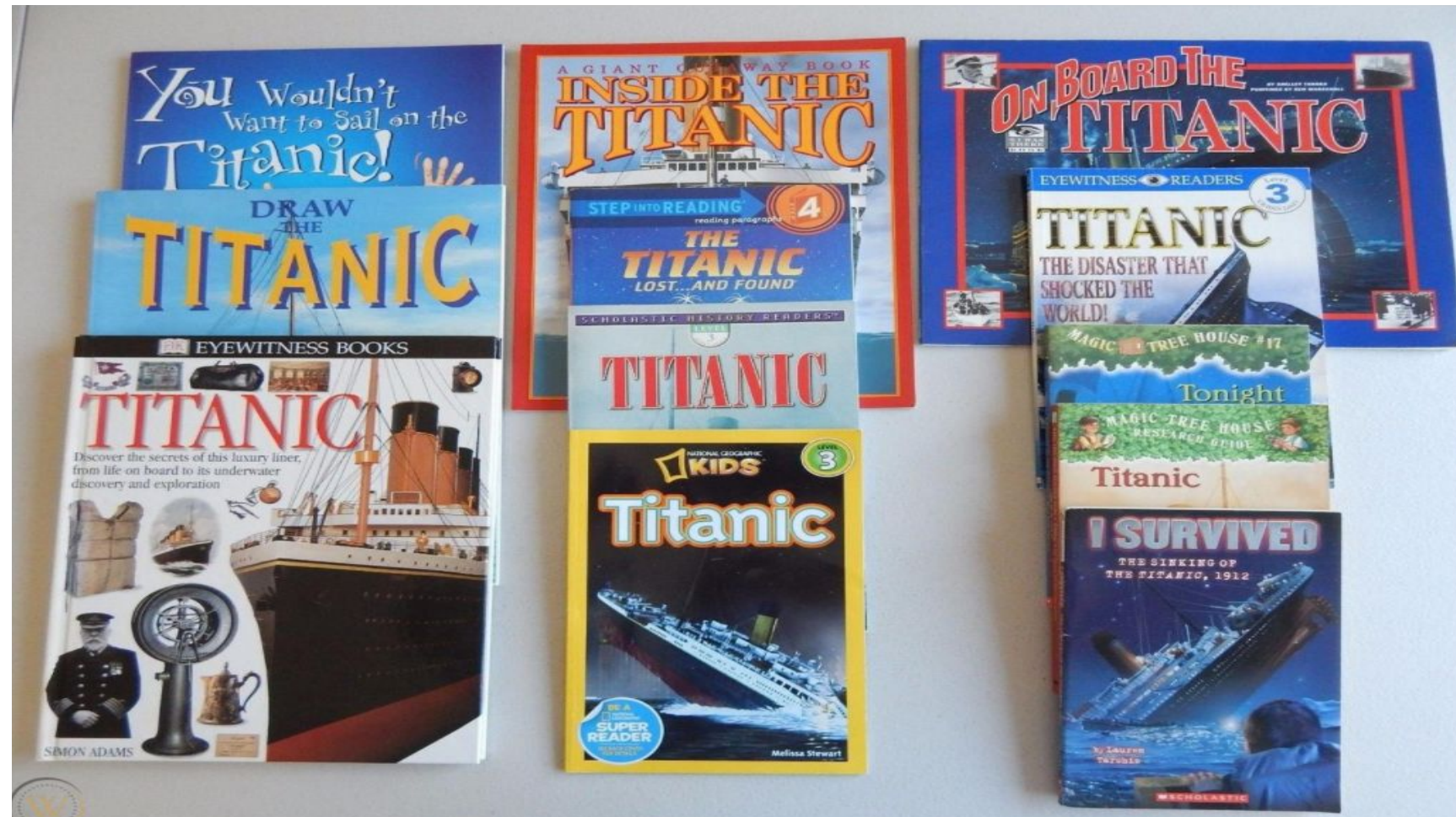
