Dear Parents / Carers,

We are pleased to welcome all the children back to school this week following the Christmas break. They are all refreshed and raring to go with their learning this term.

It is also our pleasure to welcome our new Nursery children who started school for the first time this week as well as our other new starters across the school. They have all settled in so well. I would also like to thank the other children who have made them all feel so welcomed into our school family.

It has been great to see the children in some classes this week exploring future careers from dentistry in Year 4 to Reception finding out about the people who help them in school and what their jobs entail. I even had a full interview about my role from the children and they all got a chance to sit in my chair in the office!

Nursery also had a special visitor when Kit the dog came in to meet them. There was lots of excitement and plenty of tail wagging too!

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you all about the importance of reading at home. The children do lots of reading in school but it is important that they reinforce this at home. They can read their reading book, other books or even comics. It is also really important that children hear stories read to them. That 1:1 time sharing a book before bed is such a lovely part of the day both for parents and the children. This 10 minutes a day can make a massive impact on their future life chances. I have included a link later in the flyer to a video made by Save the Children about the difference this can make. For such an important subject it is hard hitting and therefore not suitable to share with the children. Thank you for your ongoing support with your child's reading.

We continue to develop our OPAL play work at break and lunchtimes and would love to know what you think. We would be grateful if you could spend a few minutes completing a survey for us by <u>clicking here</u>.

Looking ahead, we are pleased to welcome Mr. Kirk Lester, Army Welfare Service, back into school to lead some further Forest School sessions with the children. The next sessions for Key Stage 1 will be on Monday 22nd January 2024. I would be grateful if the children could come to school with appropriate outdoor clothing on as they will be getting dirty!




We continue to focus on attendance and punctuality so please remember that our School starts at 8.55am (9am for Nursery) and anyone arriving after this time will me marked as late.






What was our school like in the past with Year 3








Kasper, Prince of Cats in Year 6
